<u>Discussion Questions:</u> Answer the following questions in complete sentences.

- 1. Explain how Louise Zamperini's career as a child scofflaw contributed to his success in surviving WWII.
- 2. Analyze how the Japanese notions of racial superiority combined with the Japanese "culture of honor" contributed to the treatment of POWs during WWII.



- 3. How and why does Louie manage to escape the downed aircraft that was on the rescue mission to Palmyra? To what forces does Louie later attribute his escape?

 Discuss/entertain other explanations for his escape.
- 4. Explain how and why a choice of attitude may have contributed to the survival of two of the men on the life raft and the death of the third man on the life raft in the Pacific Ocean.
- 5. Explain how the cultural, educational, and military indoctrination of Japanese soldiers made it likely that each soldier would rather fight to the death than be captured and held as a POW.
- 6. Explain how the advancement of the military career of Mutsuhiro Watanabe may have contributed to his attitude towards and treatment of prisoners in his camps, and particularly his treatment of Louie Zamperini.
- 7. Louie refuses the opportunity to become an "enemy propagandist" (pg 266-267) and therefore suffers even more when he is returned to the POW camps. In your opinion, why did he do so, and what would you have done in a similar situation, and why? Was Louie's decision foolish or heroic? Explain.
- 8. Describe the "guerrilla war" (page 248) waged by the prisoners in several Japanese camps. How and why did the prisoners continue to take chances with their lives in pursuing this course of action?
- 9. How and why has Louie's life changed and been redeemed by listening to Billy Graham? What seems to be the most crucial lesson that Louie learned from this speaker, and how do these lessons affect the rest of his life?
- 10. How is Louie's story of his post-war experiences both typical and atypical of an American soldier who survived Japanese prisoner-of-war camps in WWII?
